Do you have expired marine flares?

Flares manufactured in 2021 or earlier expire this year, as Transport Canada approves them for four years. They should be replaced every third or fourth boating season.

To dispose of expired flares, do not light them, throw them overboard, or add them to household garbage.

Transport Canada no longer funds the disposal of flares. Fortunately, CanBoat / NautiSavoir volunteers and select CIL Dealers are hosting Safety Equipment Education and Flare Disposal Days (see below) to collect expired marine flares for neutralization and safe disposal

EDITOR'S NOTE: The Marine Parks Forever Website has some great tips and informative articles on stern tie methods (I highly recommend visiting this site). There is also some great information on tree damage (in particular arbutus trees) that can occur from stern tie rope abrasion. It's recommended that boaters not use live trees as stern tie points whenever possible, and when it is necessary, use a towel or rag around the tree and do not free spool the stern tie rope around the tree when retrieving, thus preventing excessive bark damage.



The B. C. Marine Parks Forever Society received feedback regarding the recent improvements to the Stern Tie Program (in particular Desolation Sound and Teakerne Arm Marine Parks). Attached is a map of the Desolation Sound Area (courtesy B. C. Parks and Recreation Website: not to be used for navigation). Recent stern tie improvements include both the Desolation Sound anchorages at Tenedos Bay and at Grace Harbour, as well as the Teakerne Arm Marine Park on West Redonda Island. As a result, a program of installing yellow tags on all stern tie anchor points was completed this year, in order to make the anchor points more visible to boaters. A general note regarding Transport Canada Pleasure Boat Regulations (according to the BCCYC there is some serious consideration being given by the regulators to require that lifejackets be worn at all times):

- You are required by law to have a lifejacket or PFD (Personal Flotation Device) on board for each person on a watercraft. This includes human-powered craft.
- A lifejacket is your best defense against cold-water shock. Research shows that unexpected immersion in cold water is a serious risk to life if a boater is not wearing a flotation device. This is true despite the boater's experience, closeness to shore, and even swimming ability.
- A sudden fall into cold water can seriously affect breathing, nerves, and muscle strength. A lifejacket gives you thermal protection as well as keeping you buoyant.
- As Leo Lambert pointed out at our recent demonstration, attempting
 to swim reduces the chances of survival, because the clothes you
 wear (and the lifejacket) retain a layer of warming water from your
 body heat. Thrashing around in the water allows this warm water
 layer to escape. Use the life jacket to provide buoyancy.




Another item to note involves the testing of the CO2 cylinders employed by most of the inflatable life jackets that are so popular today. The cylinders should be checked annually to ensure that they have not been subjected to inadvertent decompression. Replacement kits are available at most marine retail outlets.

An additional important point outlined by Wade Major at our recent meeting is the recommendation to add crotch straps to the inflatable life jacket, which are prone to slipping over a person's head when they are in the water. Crotch straps are a requirement for ocean racing.



The Council of BC Yacht Clubs has provided a map showing the locations of marine pump-out stations along our part of the coast.

Sailing Quarterly Renewed C.R.Y.C. VIDEO LIBRARY GROWS


Our Video Library has been enjoying some increased use as some of our newer members have discovered this unique opportunity to explore the many aspects of sailing illustrated on video tape.



COAST GUARD INSPECTION OF RACERS MANDATORY TO COMPETE

We long ago established the requirement that vessels competing in our Racing Program must have passed a Coast Guard Safety Inspection.

Vessels wishing to participate in the May 4/5th Major Mystery Race will be expected to have a current Coast Guard Safety Sticker.

The complimentary Coast Guard Inspection assures the boater that the vessel meets (or exceeds) the minimum safety standards as required by law. This is desirable for both the Club's insurance liability, and more importantly for the boater who will then have his vessel's equipment ready for any emergency.

The complimentary Coast Guard Inspection is free, and available to all boaters - and is an even better idea for the cruisers in the club.

Racers who don't have the Coast Guard approval may be denied any honours won in a Yacht Club-sponsored race.

RACING RULES SUMMARIZED

If we have a particular philosophy that governs our Racing Program, it can best be quoted as "we race for fun, to learn, and compete within a simple set of commonsense rules". Since we don't have a sophisticated structure for "enforcing" these rules, we compete on a basic honour system.

Our Simplified Racing Rules are summarized by the letters **S.L.O.B.O.A.T.** as follows:-

Starboard Tack over Port Tack

Leeward Boat over Windward Boat

Overtaking Boat Keep Clear

Buoy Room for Inside, Overlapped Boats

Obstructions Rate Room

All Rights Lost Returning (to Re-Start)

Tacking and Gubing Boats Keep Clear




Our Annual Christmas Wine'n'Cheese Party

The event is a "BYOB" - so bring your own favorite refreshment. Cost will be \$6.00 per person; collected at the door.



Marine Surveyor Capt. Tom Burdett Addressed Our October Meeting

The role of a Marine Surveyor in our boating lives was well presented by the speaker at our October meeting. Capt. Tom Burdett is better known as the skipper of the Coast Guard Cutter "Point Race" but he has completed studies under the Society of Accredited Marine Surveyors (S.A.M.S.) in Jacksonville, Florida

Aiming for a second (retirement) career that makes good use of his vast experience in Search and Rescue, Tom gave us an excellent outline of the role of the Marine Surveyor as we prepare to purchase a vessel, insure it, or secure an appraisal or damage inspection.

Tom cautioned us that "anyone can title themselves as a marine surveyor and go into business". He answered the question as to "Why should you have the vessel surveyed?" by explaining that "most insurance companies and banks will require them on older vessels. They will need to know her condition and fair market value in order to finance and/or
